## The Inspectorate's work in schools

This year, we continue to visit schools and do different types of inspection. Some of these inspections take two or three days, while others only take one day.

During inspections, we visit classrooms to see how teaching and learning are going and we talk to students, teachers and the principal. For longer inspections, we also talk to other people involved with the school. We talk to students because it is important to hear what you think about your learning experiences and your school.





## The Inspectorate's work with Children and Young People

The Inspectorate really values children and young people's views and ideas and wants to keep getting better at listening to and supporting them. This year, we have added a page just for students to our curriculum evaluation and subject inspection reports. This page shares important findings and recommendations from inspections. You will be able to see the page when your school has had an inspection. Sometimes, we look at one area of education in several schools and write a report about what we found. These reports are called thematic reports, and you can find them on the website as well.

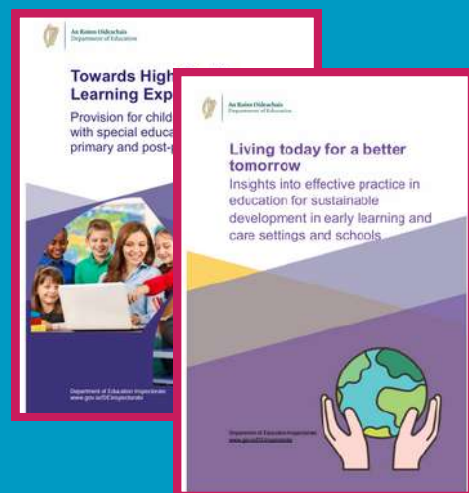
